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PROJECT SUMMARY

The over all objective for Building Democracy Project is increased attainment of human capabilities and political rights by the poor and marginalized citizens particularly youth and women leading to improved livelihoods in the targeted districts.

The specific objectives include;

- Political empowerment of citizens, in particular youth and women, through creating awareness about democratic principles and enabling them to increasingly participate in, and influence local democratic processes in the districts. Activities in this area will include workshops, radio programmes, articles and educational seminars conducted on democratic rights and a number of local campaigns addressing issues articulated by citizens.
- To enhance the capacity of communities to participate meaningfully in a decentralized system of government and ensure effective demand driven service delivery from local government. CEEWA will hold workshops and then disseminate workshop resolutions through bi-monthly radio programs to facilitate dialogue between local leaders and citizens in the Sub counties of the selected Districts.
- Making Local Governments accountable; through promoting accountability and transparency in Local Governments in the delivery of equitable and locally determined services in the districts. This will increase citizens' satisfaction with service delivery in their respective districts, increased access to information regarding the operations of Local Government institutions on resource allocation and public expenditure in the districts. CEEWA will also train local council leaders on the basics of transparent and accountable governance.
- Equal opportunities and gender equality reflected in Local Government plans and budgets and institutional practices in the districts. This objective will be achieved through increased knowledge on the National Gender Policy for Technocrats and Civil Society Organizations. Activities will include; conducting training workshops on gender mainstreaming in local government planning and budgeting, radio programmes to popularize the National Gender Policy and ensuring that gender

needs and concerns are identified and addressed by Local Governments in key sectors like education, health and agriculture.

BACKGROUND TO THE PROJECT LOCATION

In the 1995 constitution of the Republic of Uganda article 176 provides for a local government system to be set up such that the local government is divided into two units-the local councils and administrative units. Decentralization concept is further strengthened by the 1997 Local government Act of Parliament which devolved authority and responsibility of decision making, finances and management to Local government with locally elected organs and clearly defined territorial responsibility. The essence is democratic decentralization such that inclusive participation of the community in the development planning and utilization of resources. However, there are challenges to the Uganda decentralized system of local government including but not limited to the following; there are many districts (109) which poses a challenge of transferring enough resources to the district local government; comparatively low percentage of people of the project location participate in decision making about things which affect them in the local government. This is due to numerous reasons like ignorance, poverty, illiteracy, power relations and poor governance. Hence they lack the capacity to hold the local leaders accountable; administrative challenges accruing from coordination and alignment of work among central government, Development partners, CBOs, and NGOs; there exists an economic inequality in the project districts of Nakapiripirit and Bukedea compared to other parts of the country.

In addition, in Uganda there is wide spread corruption in all sectors of society-which has led to inefficient and unjust practices in public resource allocation and management. CEEWA-Uganda will contribute in tackling the of inefficiency in building democracy in selected districts of Nakapiripirit and Bukedea by challenging the social structures and practices that are undemocratic and addressing factors that keep large segments of the population in poverty and ignorance, thereby rendering them both poor and powerless.

The impacts of this project will be as follows.

- Increased participation of the different categories of citizens in the decision making at local government levels.
- Increased assertiveness of citizens in challenging injustices.
- Decreased abuse of human rights at all levels.
- Increased equitable distribution of quality services and benefits to citizens.

OBJECTIVES OF THE PROJECT

- To politically empower citizens, in particular youth and women, through creating awareness about democratic principles and enabling them to increasingly participate in, and influence local democratic processes in the districts.
- Capacity building of communities to participate meaningfully in a decentralized system of government and ensure effective demand driven service delivery from local government.
- Making Local Governments accountable; Local Government more transparent in the delivery of equitable and locally determined services in the districts.
- To ensure that the needs of the different categories of people are reflected and addressed in Local Government plans and budgets and institutional practices in the selected districts and equal opportunities and gender equality are enhanced.

PLANNED PROJECT ACTIVITIES

- Baseline survey on democracy in the selected local governments
- Workshops, radio programmes, articles and educational seminars on democratic rights
- Local campaigns addressing issues articulated by citizens.
- Dissemination workshops on resolutions

- Dialogue between local leaders and citizens in the Sub counties of the selected Districts.
- Training local council leaders on the basics of transparent and accountable governance.
- Training workshops on gender mainstreaming and democracy in local government planning and budgeting,
- Radio programmes to popularize the National Gender Policy
- Capacity building to support civic education activities in the districts.
- Conduct community-government dialogues (inter-face meetings) at sub county and district levels on resource allocations and expenditure.
- Deepening the knowledge and awareness on the National Gender Policy and the Local Governments Act among citizens.

MONITORING AND EVALUATION

To ensure efficiency and effectiveness of the project, a Monitoring and Evaluation system shall be instituted. Monitoring and Evaluation (M and E) participatory –based systems taking into consideration of all stake holders’ interest will be in built to give the project a right direction and appropriate impact. The participatory monitoring system will be controlled by the project beneficiaries who set the indicators, collect the information, and report to the project management team their findings during review meetings. The M and E system shall ensure that all aspects of the project are in order. The project management will regularly prepare technical reports according to the work plans and submit them to the board.

The Monitoring and Evaluation system will involve establishing of quarterly reviews and meeting with stakeholders, communities and civil society organizations and religious leaders in order to maximize the desired results. CEEWA-Uganda shall work with existing Civil Society Organizations or Community Based Organizations in project areas of operation.

CEEWA –Uganda will continuously document, the best practices which will be disseminated to partner organizations, district leadership and citizens at large.

The project monitoring and evaluation will be guided by the following guidelines

- Observation of implementation process
- Assessment of implementation process
- Adjustment of the remaining implementation schedule and strategy

A final post evaluation exercise will be conducted to assess the effectiveness and achievements of the project. A final report will be submitted to all stakeholders including the Development Partners.

5.0 CONCLUDING REMARKS

ORGANIZATIONAL BACKGROUND

The Council for Economic Empowerment for Women of Africa-Uganda Chapter (CEEW-Uganda) is a registered Non-Governmental, Non-Partisan and not-for-profit organization working to promote the economic empowerment of women in Uganda. CEEWA-Uganda was started in 1995; and traces its origin to the preparatory meetings for the UN Fourth World Conference on Women in Beijing, China.

VISION: A Uganda in which women’s economic aspirations, rights and productive potentials are fully recognized and mainstreamed in the framework of equitable and sustainable human development.

MISSION: To promote the economic empowerment of women in the development process through advocacy, training, research, information dissemination and documentation.

PRIORITY AREAS OF FOCUS: Gender and governance, Women and Entrepreneurship Development, Women and Agriculture, Women and Finance, Gender and Economic Decision Making.

TYPE OF WORK CONDUCTED/MAJOR ACHIEVEMENTS: CEEWA-Uganda has generated considerable experience in the areas of policy analysis, participatory needs assessments, training for capacity building in various fields of development, research, lobbying and advocacy in a number of key development issues with a bearing on women’s empowerment and gender equality. The organization has been involved in a number of researches both quantitative and qualitative. It has presented papers on topical issues; developed a number of gender sensitive training materials; and carried out trainings. It has professional and experienced members and staff in various fields to implement development projects and programs.

Under Democracy programme, CEEWA-Uganda has done the following;

2.0 PROGRESS ON IMPLEMENTATION / PROGRAM ACHIEVEMENTS

2.1 Produced and disseminated the simplified version of the Uganda Gender Policy in the selected districts

Support refinement of District BLD Partners' Gender mainstreaming action plans 2010

In order to influence policies, plans and programmes of the Local Governments and organizations to reflect gender equality, the partners needed to develop gender mainstreaming action plans to demonstrate how they would implement the process of gender mainstreaming in their BLD activities. The ultimate purpose of this activity therefore was to refine and finalize the partners' gender mainstreaming action plans using Force-Field analysis planning tools (which involves maximizing the facilitating forces and minimizing the constraining forces in any situation involving change). The objective was to review BLD partners' 2010 gender mainstreaming action plans and advise on strategies for gender mainstreaming, identify challenges and opportunities for continued gender mainstreaming by partner organizations in 2010 and harmonize partners' gender mainstreaming action plans with CEEWA Uganda's action plans for 2010.

CEEWA Uganda assisted the BLD partner organisations in the six districts to develop the Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans during the year 2010 which were integrated in their BLD activities. District based Partners' Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans were implemented by partner organisations and as a commitment each organisation endeavoured to draft and develop their own organisation's gender policy.

2.2: Identification of gender issues in education, health & agriculture.

In order to influence policies and planning at the Local Governments and organizations to reflect gender equality, CEEWA Uganda realized that there is need to identify the gender issues in education, health and agriculture sectors and utilize the findings in developing the Gender Issues Paper for Budget consultations by both Local Government and Civil Society Organisation in Planning and Budgeting processes.

The overall objective was to identify gender issues in education, health and agriculture sectors and how to address them by 2011. Specific objectives included; identifying challenges for Gender Mainstreaming in education, health and agriculture sectors, opportunities for Gender Mainstreaming in education, health and agriculture sectors and suggest for possible actions for addressing gender issues identified.

2.3: Formulation of Gender Issues Paper for budget consultations for three sectors

CEEWA Uganda produced and shared the Gender Issues Paper for budget consultations with BLD partners, in the six districts.

Gender Issues Paper on health, education and agriculture sectors is meant to be used to address the identified gaps in the respective local governments/districts.

Gender inequality in Uganda is still pervasive and has a negative impact on development by keeping certain segments of society powerless and in poverty. The enhancement of participatory processes which improve governance are an important strategy for achieving an equitable utilization of a country's resources to improve the livelihoods of its people. Gender equity is critical for good governance as it ensures the effective participation of women and men of all categories in the democratization process, leadership, decision making and law enforcement. As part of the process to operationalise the Uganda Gender Policy (2007), a gender needs assessment was conducted by CEEWA-Uganda¹ in the BLD districts early in 2010. The assessment was aimed at informing gender mainstreaming in planning and budgeting processes in the target districts. The paper was focusing on three sectors of Agriculture, Education and Health sectors.

The key recommendations for all these sectors were firstly increased funding and secondly sensitization of community members to articulate their needs and effectively advocate for their inclusion into local government planning and budgeting processes.

The paper sought to inform stakeholders', especially local government officials and civil society, of the key gender issues that need to be addressed during planning and budgeting processes in agriculture, education and health sectors so that the plans and budgets are indeed gender responsive enough to lead to equitable development.

2.4: Training of BLD partners and LC 3 Councillors in gender responsive planning and Budgeting.

CEEWA Uganda contributed to the popularization and operationalisation of the Uganda Gender Policy 2007. In order to popularise the Uganda Gender Policy in the six BLD districts, CEEWA Uganda organised and conducted trainings on gender to ultimately facilitate/influence gender-

responsive planning and budgeting in their respective Sub-counties and Districts for equitable and sustainable development.

The target group for the training was; BLD District based partner organizations (Yiga Ng'Okola (YNO) in Bukedea, Association for World Education-Uganda National Chapter (AWE-UNC) in Nakapiripirit, NGO Link Forum-Apac (NLFA), Koboko Civil Society Network (KOCISONET) in Koboko, Recreation for Development and Peace (RDP-Uganda) in Masindi), Local councillors (LC 3 Women Councillors and LC 3 Men Councillors). The specific objectives were to strengthen the participants' understanding of Gender concepts, gender needs and gender concerns, enhance the gender mainstreaming strategy for gender equality and women's empowerment, increase and promote Gender Responsive planning and budgeting through gender mainstreaming in BLD activities and Local Government Departments and also encourage the implementation of the Uganda Gender Policy 2007. The training comprised of 149 participants from partner organizations and sub-counties in the six BLD districts. 42 staff, civic educators and members from BLD partner organizations in six districts participated in the training (19males and 23females). 107 LC3 councillors from six BLD districts participated in the training (41males and 66 females).

2.5: Production of the Gender Mainstreaming Training Modules

produced and disseminated the Gender Mainstreaming training modules in the six BLD districts to improve the BLD partner organisations' capacity building in gender mainstreaming and to provide guidance in gender responsive planning and budgeting. This was done to ensure that Local Governments' and BLD Partners' knowledge and skills in Gender mainstreaming increase. CEEWA Uganda also demonstrated on the usage of the modules to the BLD partner organizations during the dissemination meetings. The book involved eight modules including; Basic Gender concepts/definitions, Gender Analysis: different roles women and men play, Gender and Development. Gender and Livelihoods: How individuals, households and communities make their living, Prioritising development interventions, Gender Disaggregated Data (GDD), Gender Responsive Planning and Budgeting and the Elements of the Uganda Gender Policy. The modules entail tools that would enable users to understand and integrate gender in the development processes.

2.6: Follow-up dialogues on the Uganda Gender Policy (UGP)

The objective of the follow-up was to review the BLD Partner organizations', LC3 Councilors' and District local government technocrats' and Departments' implementation of the Uganda Gender Policy in respect of resource allocation and development. The specific objectives were to: establish how far the districts have gone in addressing gender issues in Local Government planning and budgeting following the launch of the Simplified Version of the Uganda Gender Policy; identify the existing gaps as far as gender responsive planning and budgeting is concerned and recommend what should be done for the BLD District Local Governments and councilors to address gender issues in relation to the UGP priority areas of action (Gender and livelihoods, Gender and rights, Gender and Governance and Gender and Macro-economic Management).

The follow-up dialogues targeted BLD districts were: BLD Partner organizations in six districts, LC3 Councilors (male and female councilors) from Sub-counties, District Local Government officers/technocrats (CAO, District planners, CDO, LC 5 Chair persons, Heads of departments of education, health and agriculture). The majority of the above attended the dialogue in their respective districts. Therefore, 52 females 77 males participated in the follow-up dialogues on the Uganda Gender Policy from the six BLD districts (i.e. 129 participants from partner organizations, local councilors and local government departments). In all BLD districts, some women asserted, they understand/know their rights and men recognize women's rights to participate in decision making at all levels.

2.7: Support information sharing on Local Gender issues through print and audio (Articles on the relevance of the Uganda Gender Policy to the rural woman in Uganda)

CEEWA-Uganda also published articles in the New Vision, Etop and Rupiny). This was done to increase citizens' knowledge on relevant legislations and policies to promote equal opportunities for men and women, boys and girls at all levels. CEEWA Uganda's focus was on the Uganda Gender Policy which was enacted and launched in 2007. CEEWA has since 2008 popularized the Uganda Gender Policy in the districts of Iganga, Nakapiripiti, Bukedea, Apac, Koboko and Masindi. The goal of the policy is to achieve gender equality and women's empowerment and its purpose is to guide all stakeholders in planning, resource allocation, implementation and monitoring and evaluation of programmes with a gender perspective. The policy seeks to increase knowledge of human rights, strengthen women's involvement in decision making, reduce gender inequalities between women and men, girls and boys, and ensure inclusion of gender analysis in macro-economic policy formulation.

One of the articles was in English (published in New Vision) while others were translated in Ateso (published in Etop) and Luo published in Rupiny. This was basically on the relevance of the Uganda Gender Policy to the rural woman in Uganda and the articles entailed/showed the progress made and challenges realised in implementing the policy and the need to increase information and call for vigorous implementation of the gender policy.

2.8: Follow-up on Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans of district based BLD partners.

In order to influence policies and planning at the Local Governments and organizations to reflect gender equality, the partners developed gender mainstreaming action plans to help in the implementation process of gender mainstreaming in BLD activities.

The tool used to develop and refine the partners' Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans was the Force-Field analysis tool.

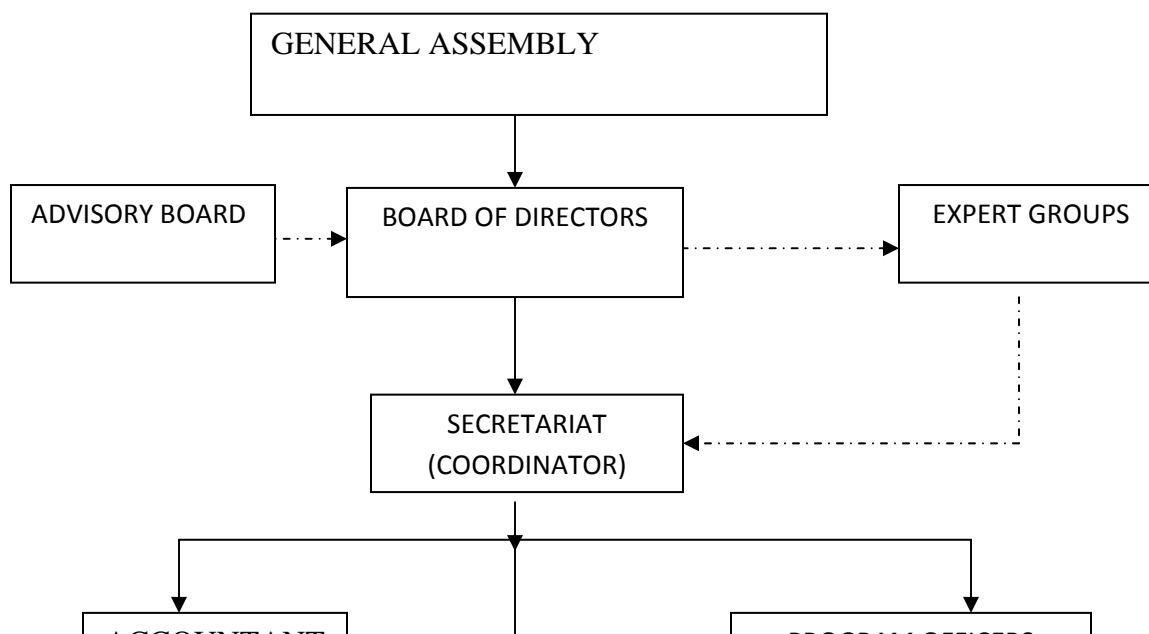
It is against this back ground that CEEWA-Uganda engaged herself in a follow-up activity on Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans for district based partner organizations.

The objectives included; to review status of implementation of the BLD partners' 2010 Gender Mainstreaming Action Plans so as to determine what activities that have been done and those that have not been done, identify challenges and opportunities for continued Gender Mainstreaming by partner organizations and harmonize partners' gender mainstreaming action plans with CEEWA-Uganda's activities for 2011.

GOVERNANCE STRUCTURE:

CEEWA-Uganda has three organs (levels) of governance: the General Assembly, which is the supreme governing body, the Board of Directors consisting of twelve members elected by the General Assembly and is responsible for policy formulation and the Executive Committee comprising four members (Chairperson, Vice-Chairperson, Treasurer and Board Secretary) who oversee the implementation of policies and programmes on behalf of the Board. CEEWA-Uganda has a Secretariat headed by a Coordinator managing Projects and Programmes staff (salaried and volunteers), support staff and the organization's assets.
